Tomorrow marks the first day of spring, by calendar date anyway. Time is moving along so fast, and we're all still trying to keep warm and shovel our path in the snow.

This spring we have many exciting activities scheduled for the Lands and Resources Department. February 16 Mushgekowuk TC provided initial training in Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment to the Emergency Management Response Team, equipping the team to proceed with this aspect in its goal to develop a Master Emergency Response Plan for the community. March 17-18th the department will be participating in a facilitated strategic planning session that will help set out the short and long term goals in a more comprehensive way, so that we can more clearly organize for future success and continued expansion of the department. We are continuing to staff up the department. The Community Energy Champion will be recruited in the coming weeks, and we hope to interview for the Marine Research Assistant in March. If you have not yet done so, please review this job posting to see if it may be a good fit for you and get your resume in!

We received six expressions of interest from members for the Species at Risk Land Visioning Tool pilot (a program of Environment Canada). We are scheduling our first 1.5-2 hour session to discuss species at risk in the traditional territories for Wednesday February 9, at 6 p.m. If you are interested in attending please email tsullivan@missanabiecree.com and we'll register you to the focus group.

Michelle, our GIS Lands and Resources Technician, has (Continued on page 5) Mee kisi Peesim

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completed the review of the Forestry Companies 'Annual Work Schedules' scheduled to commence April 1, 2022, with the aim to protect Missanabie Cree's values on the land from negative impacts of forestry operations. We continue to advocate strongly for zero aerial herbicide spraying and recently met with Health Canada and Ministry of Environment Conservation and Parks to discuss their regulations and policies on this matter.

Ty, our Mining and Environmental Lands and Resources Technician has been providing keen stewardship and oversight of all the mining activities underway in the territories. Environmental monitoring committees are now established and the work to get out in the field to conduct water testing, and research cumulative impacts is being planned for 2022. We are negotiating an exploration agreement and about to initiate another, and we are in the process of renegotiating the Community Benefit Agreement (CBA) with Alamos, and the implementation phase of the CBA with Argonaut.

Ross, our Housing Intern has been researching housing designs and General Contractors, Housing Programs and policies, to further planning efforts and get construction underway for the development of 4 CMHC housing units this year. Ross is also helping with presentation materials for the upcoming Species at Risk Land Visioning workshops.

There are two other major projects that Lands and Resources has submitted funding proposals for; one is for Fire and Flood Risk Mapping of the traditional territories (with Drone Training for the EM Response Team), to dovetail with the Terra Stories Naming Project described last Newsletter, the other is for funding from Environment Canada and Wildlife Acoustics, to conduct wildlife acoustic monitoring for at risk species of bats (the Little Brown and Northern Myotis) and birds (Common Nighthawk, and Canada Warbler). If awarded, the department will be sure to offer participation in these activities.

We are working with our partners Garden River First Nation, Mohawks on the Bay of Quinte and Summers and Co. to finalize the purchase of a former federal government building at 1 Front Street Belleville, Ontario. The building will be converted to approximately 40 apartments that will be available to rent in 2023. MCBLP continues to look for projects in all of MCFN communities (Missanabie, Wawa, Sault, Sudbury, Thunder Bay, London, Toronto) and will continue to report to Chief and Council on our progress.

On June 22, 2012, the day that Shannen would have graduated, construction started on a new school in Attawapiskat – the Kattawapiskak Elementary School



We have a vision of a people who are bi-cultural and bi-lingual; a people who can walk in both worlds contributing to our well-being, the well-being of other Indigenous Peoples; contributing and competing globally.

We have a vision of a Nation of people who respect the dignity of all; a people who find balance through equality.

We have a vision of people who respect the environment, harvesting and reaping the resources of the land in a sustainable manner as responsible stewards for the use of future generations.

We are the Omushkego of the Missanabie Cree Ililiwak; whose vision it is to regain and restore our rightful place and through the strength of our people, never again be denied our place in society.
