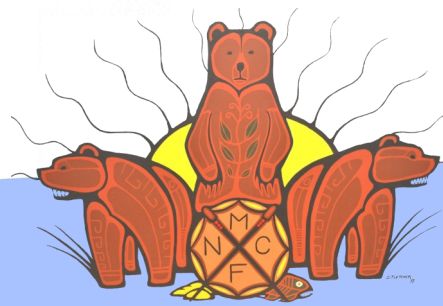

I was very proud and humbled by the Mushkegowuk AGA being held in our community, it was an emotional time filled with fraternity and positive energy. The staff provided the catering, and did a wonderful job.

Council met for a few days after to discuss resource development within our traditional territory and the partnerships we have developed over the last two years. We also discussed the codes and policies that we will be looking at reviewing within the next year. We discussed our plan for the rest of our term, looking at both our communication strategy and ratification process.

The court case settlement is fast approaching, and will be in Toronto in February 2016, I request that all those that attend from our First Nation, please do so. Details will be provided by our lawyer in the upcoming newsletter. I am looking forward to the courts finally making a decision on our settlement, this a huge step to completing our settlement.

I am happy to let our membership know that we have a plan to take us out of debt with the multi-purpose facility and the Echo Bay facility. We have engaged in discussions with several businesses to rent and lease space in the facility, to no avail. We have spoke to NAN, Mushkegowuk and the NSRCF to have training out of the facility and they are researching options. We will continue to be diligent and creative. We have a substantial debt to

overcome, but I am positive and confident we will be successful.

We have engaged in several partnerships as of late to both create long term contracts that will permanently get us out of debt and bring in much needed revenue streams. These partnerships will be both announced and detailed in the upcoming months. They have taken hundreds of hours each to create and will put us in what I believe will be a better position financially that we have ever been in the past. Thank you to all those that have participated in these negotiations.

With work from Bobbi Fletcher-Decorte and myself working closely with Kunuwanimano, we will be soon be getting a family support worker on staff. This has been a long time coming, and I am very anxious to post for this position soon. Thanks for all your help, Bobbi!

I know there has been some concern regarding the student allowances, I have stayed up countless nights looking at ways to find funds for this governmental shortfall. We have some ideas we still have to work out, but I am confident that we will find the funding by December 31st 2015. I am so proud of every student and hope to see each of them succeed.

Next, to clarify, I want to set the record straight, in discussions with the interested party that was to purchase Castle Building Center prior to the new Chief and Council that is presently presiding. In further investigation, there was no further interest not because of the current Chief and Council, they just simply became disinterested in the purchase. What you hear that contradicts this is false, deliberately misleading and slanderous.

To clarify, I will also go on the record stating (again) I was not in support of the purchase of castle. It was recommended by our auditor not to make the purchase, and I opposed it in motion. I will share that motion with anyone who requests it.

We are coming up to an election in August 2016, and you are going to hear a lot of misinformation, please if you have any questions, please ask, I will answer you, even if it is brief and to the point. We are working on a social media policy that prevents staff and Chief and council to get "caught up" in the Facebook drama. We are also looking at addressing more of the policies and codes in the upcoming months. I believe the administration code is next to be reviewed.

I have noticed also that Council have been working a lot better in the past month and we have had some positive

This past month has quickly gone by, not only personally with family get-togethers and birthdays, but with additional council participation.

In late September, some of council were able to meet for a separate conference call in regards to a Moose Aerial Inventory Report review. This inventory report was also presented early in the week at the Gathering. In early October, another separate conference call was held with Ministry of Natural Resources & Forestry in regards to the Martel Forest Management Phase 2. Summaries were provided of the six different First Nations involvement in the development of the Phase 2 plan, and of course, the protection of our Aboriginal values.

MCFN involvement includes participation from the Chief and Councillor Nolan on the planning team, and there was community presentation and discussion held this

and effective meetings. We are still waiting for funding for the comprehensive community planning and hope to get news on that soon.

We are also looking at getting some upgrading done to Island View camp again in the spring, focusing on the pavilion and the cabins. Also we are pushing our marketing with a "revamped" website and some pictures posted.

The healing lodge is still coming along, it has had some minor setbacks but I believe that it should be completed by the end of November. I believe that this will be a great step towards both community and personal healing.

I feel better now that I have been smoke free for 1 year now and drug and alcohol free for 20 years. I hope to lead by example, that's what my elders tell me.

Lastly, to all those I offended, I sincerely and humbly ask your forgiveness, I will put my tobacco down and thank the creator for lifting this weight off my shoulders. I make mistakes, and may again, but I find comfort in the fact that either I win or I learn, there are no losers.

Some other items included review of the draft social media/communication policy, a presentation on ACR train opportunities, discussion on hunting declaration, and discussion with Lolly Rawlyk on the Elder Liaison report.

EDUCATION REPORT

All the required documents for post-secondary funding are now on the missanabiecreefn.com website under Members. Please note the deadlines will be edited as they change. Students interested in going back to school can download and print them and apply for funding prior to the deadlines for each year they attend school.

The process that we did in the decision making for funding students this year are as follows:

- a) The completed applications received prior to the deadline are those who are the first to be funded.
- b) The applicants who submitted late applications where approved for tuition, books and supplies but not a living allowance and only if we had extra funding. Applications received from eligible students after the post-

secondary education budget is exhausted will be deferred until the following year or until the budget for the program is reallocated. There is no guarantee of funding.

- c) The living allowance was adjusted by 5% to allow us to fully fund 24 students this year which is the most we have ever had in all the years past, and only two students received tuition, books and supplies because they were late or taking schooling on a part-time basis.
- d) Should students drop out or decide to continue their education at a later date, those funds will be reissued to other students.
- e) The Education Coordinator's salary will not be coming from the Education Money this year as we have allocated all of it to the students.
- f) The Band Manager approved the 5% adjustment as per the MCFN Education Policy which states in section 4 (c) under Support for Living Expenses - "The allowances set out in annex I are for resourcing purposes. Missanabie Cree First Nation Post-Secondary Program has the flexibility to adjust these rates, either higher or lower, to meet the individual needs of students. The support for living expenses is expected to cover such costs as food, shelter, daily transportation, daycare, rental costs and contingency funding. Therefore, to be able to pay for 24 students tuition, books, living allowances and additional student fees, we adjusted the living allowance by 5% otherwise, we would be unable to support all the students who applied on time.
- g) Students who do not have enough money for books are to submit their receipts and will receive additional assistance should it be needed but we **will require** receipts.
- h) There is no guarantee of funding.

Should anyone who attends school have questions regarding funding, please call the office and your questions will be answered personally to you.

Trusting this will explain the rationale behind the 5 % adjustment.

Good Luck in Your Schooling! Work Hard and Get all A's! That should be one of your goals.

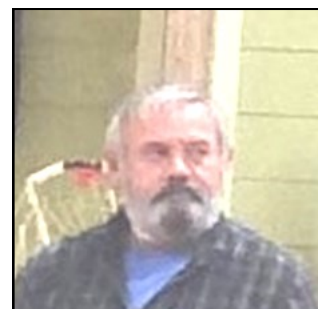

In Loving Memory of our Uncle Fred:

Uncle Fred would often come to visit us in Thunder Bay. He would call and say that he was on his way with his bike. My mom would then phone my cousin who was an OPP officer in Schreiber and he would in turn notify the other detachments to be on the lookout for Uncle Fred to make sure that he was safe and okay. When he was leaving Thunder Bay again a call would be made and they would watch for him going back to the Soo.

We were talking about Uncle Fred while having Thanksgiving dinner and some of the stories we cherish. First of all Doug, Moonie and Bobbi would charge their friends 5 cents each to watch Uncle Fred do his bead work on the loom. As a matter of fact we still have the rings, bands and other things he made for us.

Bobbi even mentioned that she and a friend would have a puppet show and charge Uncle Fred 5 cents to watch. He would sit there with his tea while watching the show. We would sit and chat with him and he would tell us some stories about when he was in the bush. Dad of course also had stories of Uncle Fred in the bush. Some of these stories were quite funny.

One thing we remember most is that Uncle Fred liked his night time snacks. It was always around the same time each night. He would have toast with jam and either cookies or pastry with his tea. He liked it when we baked and enjoyed sampling everything.

While in Thunder Bay, Uncle Fred would go to his favorite places like the library, Value Village or Chapters. When it was colder outside he would take the bus. I remember when I was on my way home from work I saw him at a bus stop and pulled over to give him a ride. He was on

his way to Chapters so I gave him a ride. He would give me an update of what he was doing that day.

As mentioned earlier we talk of Uncle Fred often. May you rest in peace Uncle Fred.

We have a vision of people who respect the environment, harvesting and reaping the resources of the land in a sustainable manner as responsible stewards for the use of future generations.

We are the Anishnabe of the Missanabie Cree First Nation whose vision it is to regain and restore our rightful place and through the strength of our people, never again be denied our place in society.
