

On July 1, Canada celebrates its 150th anniversary as a nation state. Many indigenous peoples throughout Canada have said they will not celebrate this day. Their reasons are not hard to comprehend. They cite our history of oppression under colonialist rule, the breaking of our peace and friendship treaties, cultural genocide, residential schools, the sixties scoop, and the Indian Act.



Indigenous Truth

People may argue that this is all in the past. But the truth is that government policies continue to oppress our people, and prevent our moving forward in areas of health, education, and economic development. Many communities have to deal with lack of clean water and substandard housing, but this pales in comparison to the epidemic of suicides in some of our communities.

Our people have to fear for the health and safety of our women and children. The MMIW Inquiry does not seem to be going anywhere, with families calling for a more open and inclusive process. The Government of Canada is going to court over the ruling of the Human Rights Tribunal concerning the inequities in the provision of child welfare services for FN children on reserve. Indigenous people are dying in Thunder Bay at an alarming rate and under suspicious circumstances. It is not surprising that many of our people say that Canada 150 is nothing to celebrate.

Even so, our people continue to resist, to work, and to take care of families and communities as best they can. Although we have been and continue to be oppressed, we have our rights, our culture, the wisdom of our elders, and a future to work toward. Let's keep on keeping on.

Hello Band Members:

Many of you know me but for those of you who don't I would like to introduce myself. My name is Jackie Fletcher and I have been hired as the Elder/Youth Coordinator. I have been involved with our First Nation since the beginning, 1992, when I was a councilor for 9 years. I have been employed a few times and volunteered on many committees. I still volunteer for the Governance Coordinating Committee and the Community Comprehensive Planning Committee.

This position allows me to build the gap between the youth and elders, which has always been on my mind. I will be working with the Wellness Team (Terry Lee Montgomery – Family Well-Being Worker, Patricia Lesage – Family Support Worker, Laura Lee Rawlyk – Elder Liaison, and Alexandra Pezzo – Youth Representative and from time to time Lesley Gagnon, Program Development Officer and Deb Clement, Gathering Coordinator). We will be working together to coordinate and oversee cultural events and programs and meetings.

I am requesting your input. If you have any ideas or suggestions that fit the bulleted list below please forward them to me and I will share with the team participants. We will look at the possibilities together and will do our best to come up with a plan to incorporate your ideas. I will be looking for ways to:

- create a forum for Youth and Elders to communicate and share knowledge
- engage the community in cultural mentoring between Youth and Elders
- incorporate activities that members are interested in
- participate in cultural training programs
- participate and assist the family wellness team on

activities

- encourage Youth and Elders to participate where they can
- incorporate cross generational knowledge transfer sessions
- pull together Youth and Elder gatherings working with Judy and Michael Bopp
- plan, develop and implement cross generational knowledge transfer sessions

I will also be meeting with the Comprehensive Community Planning team and working with other staff members who have a role to play in this project.

There is so much to do with our First Nation but I can see we are and have been building capacity on many levels. I see many of our members returning to school, college, or university or have graduated from these places. Others have been honing their skills in business management, entrepreneurship, housing construction, trades, securing employment outside of the First Nation, while others are staying connected with this band in one way or another, either volunteering, visiting, attending Elders teas, participating in programs and classes, band meetings and reading the Bear Fax or following the website. It is exciting to see so many of our people working at the band office. Look forward to hearing from you.



Time is flying by! It's incredible! We did some soil preparation and planting our seedlings in our community garden earlier in June. It's amazing how fast the weeds grow though! ☐

We can meet and pick up people on the drive down to Wonderland or even meet at Wonderland and then go in as a group. Please call June ASAP because we only have about 20 tickets left, and we want everyone to go that wants to. Our age limit has risen to include those up to 25. If you have any questions about whether you or someone else is eligible to go please call June to find out about it.

We will be doing more activities during our annual Gathering though, such as scavenger hunt and nature walks. People have asked about the canoe jousting so that may happen too.



POST SECONDARY EDUCATION OFFICER

All current applicants for academic year 2017 – 2018 have been sent letters. Every applicant is encouraged to apply for student loans, awards, bursaries etcetera from their post-secondary institutions. There are also numerous awards available: see both INAC and Government of Canada websites. Each province of original residence has grant portions for their student loans – they also make changes to their criteria from time to time.

We cannot guarantee full funding for all applicants – that is the same every year. The INAC program has criteria that needs to be met – they have been emphasizing compliance to program. So if you think your Education Officer is being picky, that might be why. Please call me if you have questions.

If you have not submitted a copy of your diplomas from previous years of being supported by Missanabie Cree First Nation, please send them in so I can add them to

your file. If you are not sure, call or email me. This is another one of the compliance items.

The post-secondary education policies are posted on our website under the Education tab. The application forms for 2017-2018 academic year will be there until late fall. Download the application forms to your device, complete them, sign and date and then you may fax, scan and email or send by Canada Post.

If you are still in high school, check with your guidance counsellors for college or university credit share programs in your area. If you are thinking about going to college or university and are not sure because you have been out of school for so long...Go for a tour at a nearby college or university. Explore your options. Call or come see me for a chat.

Concerning the Gathering

GATHERING COORDINATOR

Whachay/oki/tansi/aniin members of Missanabie Cree, This year's theme is "Creating/building peace".

Pick a definition of peace and ask yourself: what can I do or make to show this peace and bring it to the gathering to share?

How do we know when we are successful in building peace within our Nation? How do we know we have built peace among our family? How do I build peace within myself? What are the behaviours that build peace? What is one thing that this one person can do that will bring us closer to peace? What artwork can you create to show peace? Are you willing to donate it? Do you want it displayed?

The final preparations for this year's gathering are still in process. Still needed are more volunteers to do activities. This is our annual gathering: Missanabie Cree First Nation staff cannot do it all nor can the ad hoc committee members: the gathering needs your actions.

A list of activities that we are hoping to have at the gathering was posted in the June Bear Fax report. The ones that had no initials means that we need someone to volunteer to help or facilitate.

If the facilitators make changes, they are all asked to please ensure that announcements are made at meal times and on the communication board. Last year, some of the facilitators changed the schedule at the last minute and the message did not reach all of the signed up

participants. Please be aware that not everyone is staying at Island View Camp or Ernie's.

The deadline for registration for attending the gathering is/was July 7th.

Late registrants are definitely not guaranteed assistance with travel regardless of the method of travelling. The costs for everything have increased yet our budget has not increased. The majority of our costs go to the task of bringing everyone together and providing basic accommodations and providing something about food.

**** We do not have a caterer solidified as we are still in negotiations. We expect that to happen by Bear Fax print time but I am submitting this report on June 29th.

Please do not expect a supper on travel day August 12th. Cold breakfast supplies for Sunday the 13th will be available at the Multi-purpose Centre, and lunch items will be available to BBQ: caterer to start preparing food from Sunday the 13th supper to a cold breakfast on Saturday August 19th.

Accommodation lists will be posted. Please let the youth and children know that they will not be assigned a bed: mattresses can be signed out. There will also be tents available. Those who are under 55 years of age will not be assigned beds either if none are available. Please remember that accommodations are shared. Priority bed assignments are elders and identified medical conditions. If your application does not have this specified, please do not assume that you are getting a bed assigned.

If you have requested to be at IVC and there was insufficient room at IVC, you will be assigned to share with someone at Ernie's. Every year, we get requests for IVC RV sites that exceed the number of spots thus we have reserved a number of RV sites at Ernie's. Campers please be aware that you need to not use up an RV site if you have no RV. This is true for both IVC and Ernie's.

Some families will have identified that they want to

share with others and that total can be 15 adults, children and youth: please know that the accommodations do not have 15 beds in each cabin/trailer and that multiple cabins are not available for all of the people on one registration form. They have to work it out amongst themselves. That is why we have purchased tents and mattresses.

Check in at both IVC and Ernie's is at 3 PM on August 12th. Checkout at both IVC and Ernie's is 9 AM on August 19th. They have to prepare the cabins for the arriving guests at 3 PM.

Our Gathering's miscellaneous budget is very small and that covers items such as the port-a-potties, extra toilet paper for the cabins, water, supplies for activities, some items for our cultural workshops, and other items. And if we have extra funds as we do up the final numbers in the fall, we may provide some small honorariums to our extraordinary volunteers. Honorariums cannot be guaranteed. All volunteers are greatly appreciated.

Please remember that the Gathering is for the purpose of bringing Missanabie Cree family together: the members of MCFN include registered members, their spouses or partners, their children, and their grandchildren. Nevertheless, we do not have the funds to provide individual return plane tickets for the non-registered family members.

Please do not bring your friends. If everyone brought a friend we would not be able to feed or accommodate them. As it already is, we do not have enough beds and have limited food available.

This year's theme is "Creating/building peace".

TWO CEREMONIES

Part I: Richmond Water Ceremony – June 13, 2017

Earlier in the day while I was attending the sacred fire and sharing circle, I asked if someone could take me to the water site where we could launch our little boats. An employee drove me to the area. It was very closed in space and not much room but I could work with it.

Everyone (about 30 people, including MCFN staff, members, Council, guests, mining officials) all came to the water area. I provided instructions on how to make the vessels that would carry our prayers to the water. Each person was to make their own and we used bio degradable materials (birch bark or paper and twigs to hold the ends together) for the little boats.

While the vessels were being made each person was offered the smudge by Isabell Souliere and Theresa Binda played the drum and sang a water song. Before the vessels were put in the water we all said a prayer together

and named the lake, which was Maskinonge. We apologized for polluting the waters and asked for forgiveness and then put tobacco in the boats. While we were setting them in the water Theresa sang another song. There was a lot of pollen in the water near the shore and the wind was coming into the shore so all the vessels were crowded.

I made a statement that this ceremony must be continued.

Water from Maskinonge Lake is used for freshwater at the Mill and domestic use at mine site. After tailings is discharged from the mill into the Primary Pond, passive treatment occurs, then water is transferred to a Secondary Pond for final polishing. After all treatment, final treated effluent flows to the Secondary Pond to Goudreau Lake. -source: Vincent Ramcharan - Richmond

While the ceremony was happening, an eagle flew in circles above us. I saw three eagles that day.



Thanks to Kyle and David Ouellet for all their readiness to help whenever I needed them, to Roxanne Metlin for the pictures, to Isabell Souliere for doing the smudging and Theresa Binda for drumming and singing. Thanks to everyone who attended, thanks to MCFN Council for organizing the event, thanks to the mine officials who provided the venue space and food. I also would like to acknowledge Clifford and Don Waboose for the sunrise ceremony and the two young men from Batchewana who were drummers and singers. It was a good day.

PART II: Richmond Graduation Event Tuesday, June 13, 2017

Graduation ceremonies for MCFN trainees sponsored by:
MCFN/RICHMONT – CBA
Northern College- trainer – 15 weeks
Mushkegowuk provided wages

I did the opening prayer for this ceremony. Chief Jason Gauthier, College reps. and Vincent Ramcharan, Richmond opened with welcoming and congratulatory remarks to the participants. The participants were provided a cap and gown and were asked to come up on the stage one at a time to receive their certificates and jack-

ets from the College. David Ouellet did a cartwheel when his name was called. Snacks and a cake were provided for the celebration. I provided congratulations and a closing prayer.

The program was 8 turnarounds of 7 days on, 7 days off with a total duration of 15 weeks (March 1, 2017 to June 13, 2017). The students completed 560 hours of training both with the instructor and on placement. The students were with the Northern College instructor for 5 turnarounds (350 hours) and on placement for 3 turnarounds (210 hours). All the training was done on site at Richmond Mine. -

Here is something to think about! Did you know that most of our sister's First Nation's have no Elders Council? Let's take a moment to think about that!

" I AM AN ELDER!" Don't I have a say!

Hear ye! Hear ye!

I have continually noticed again that, proper protocol

needs to be consistent across the board when it comes to conferences, workshops and lectures, etc. This starts with the Chief, Councillors, and honourable members, the Elders and Elders Council. This also works on the honor system.

The proper protocol for an Elder to qualify for a conferences, workshops and lectures etc. will be to go through the Band Administrator (Doreen Boissoneau) and she will forward the information to the Elder Liaison (Laura-Lee Rawlyk).

It is also an Elder's responsibility to notify the Liaison of your attendance to these conferences other than representing the Elder for Missanabie Cree First Nations. I believe that with everyone following the Elders protocol practices and the honor system that we will have the three C's, consistency, continuity and communication!




We also did rock painting, crafts, and held a feast (Shirley Horn made bannocks) and a giveaway. We in-


cluded handouts on Personal Bill of Rights, Giveaway process and t-shirts. We had a total of 17 females and 20 males.
