Need a recipe for 10-hour tourtière with marinated moose meat? Want to know the steps to truss a boneless stuffed beaver? How about the cooking time for a wild goose in a slow cooker?

The Waswanipi cook set up this page to share recipes, techniques and photos of Cree traditional food. Thanks to Paul Ottereyes, there's a Facebook page for that.

"It's honouring our traditional food heritage", says Ottereyes. "That's why I created that Facebook page, to honour our traditional food which we still eat in all our

Now that the spring goose hunt is underway in the north, many hunters and cooks are swapping suggestions for the best way to make sigabon, or slow-roasted goose.

"We like to cook it on an open fire," says Ottereyes. "We tie it up on a string. It's a plain old Cree traditional

recipe, one of my favourite recipes. There's no magic about it, just patience."

We are having difficulties filling the positions for students to work for our First Nation, so please if you are going back to school come and work for us for the summer.

I went for a drive around the Echo Bay and Bruce Mines area and the sweet grass is out now. Smells so good!

COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OFFICER

It's been extra busy in the Economic Development office, training of a new staff member; implementing projects; researching funding sources and applications; the Taking Care of Our Land Symposium; the Community Comprehensive Planning working session at Algoma University with the Prosperity Committee; and the Working Planning Session at Island View Camp with the Consultant, MacLeod and Farley and MCDC on May 20th and 21st. With that, we welcome aboard Terri Nolan, who has been hired to complete a short term assignment to assist with our Lands and Resources initiatives that will be highlighted in my Community Economic Development Report.

Northern Governance Innovation for Socially Resilient Boreal Communities

Chief Jason Gauthier and myself have been working on this project since September 2014. It's a collaboration between the University of Winnipeg, Algoma University, University of Saskatchewan, Beardy's and Okemasis First Nation and Missanabie Cree First Nation. The project was launched at the gdo akiiminann ganawenda-

naan Taking Care of our Lands Symposium held on May 4th - 6th, 2015, at the Holiday Inn and Suites in Sault Ste. Marie.

Aboriginal Communities are resilient to transition and crisis. Many have endured and succeeded amidst pressures from colonialism, global economic restructuring, climate change, large-scale timber, mineral and energy development, and political reform. This research is intended to examine how Northern Aboriginal governance innovations are linked to social resilience in natural rich settings.

Jessica Numminen is a Masters Student with the University of Winnipeg who has been assigned to the project with Missanabie Cree First Nation for a period of five weeks. Jessica will be conducting preliminary research for our department to submit and revitalize an existing CORDA application for Non-Timber Forest Products and a soil type investigation within the Traditional Territory working with the Rural Agri-Innovative Network (RAIN). This project will also address our Food Security direc-

tives deriving from the CCP. We also included a medicine walk with Elder, Frank Belleau of Garden River First Nation who provided us with thorough knowledge of the Plant Nation through a medicine walk within the Creator's Garden (Garden River First Nation) on May 22nd, 2015, and a trip to Thessalon First Nation to tour their "Wild Foods Distribution Hub Facility" on May 19th, 2015. *(Editor's note: RAIN is a network based in Algoma District and its objective is to improve capacity, innovation, and research in agriculture economic development. www.rainalgoma.ca)*

CCP Working Session – Algoma University

I am a natural community developer and enjoyed working with Louise, B.G., Les, Debbie, Marion, and Jackie to "brainstorm" clearly defined goals to generate growth and prosperity. This working session was hosted at Algoma University on April 25th and 26th, 2015. I was also excited to meet Michael and Judy Bopp, who wrote the book "Recreating the World" and was able to get my own copy autographed. It was a pretty awesome weekend with this enthusiastic, talented and creative group of members who are devoting their time and energy to establish our main goal of achieving "Meh Lew Pi Ma Ti Sew in" meaning the good life for all the members of Missanabie Cree First Nation!

Island View Camp – MacLeod and Farley/Business Needs Assessment (Joint Planning Session)

We departed on the morning of May 20th, 2015, to attend a coordinated working session with Rick MacLeod, the acquired consultant to evaluate their Community Tourism Planning Approach for Island View Camp. Ty Hourtovenko, resident camp manager and MCDC, Board of Director, Shirley Horn, along with Cathy Clement, Band Manager, Terri Nolan, Jessica Numminen and myself were in attendance. The goals were to review the latest project information to check for accuracy; to ensure a full understanding of the project before proceeding to the next step; immediate enhancement planning and

business plan expansion; overall concept, direction, vision, key objectives and website enhancement. It was a very productive two days!

Taking Care of Our Land Symposium (gdo akiiminaan ganawendanaan)

The Anishinaabe Initiatives Division and the Department of Geography and Geology at Algoma University in partnership brought a collective of minds together to exploring Aboriginal Land Management, Planning and Use from diverse perspectives. The purpose of the symposium is to begin exploring through research and best practices, the inclusion of cultural and traditional practices of land management, planning and use for Aboriginal communities in Northern Ontario.

The four themes using the Medicine Wheel Framework guided the process and planning.

The opening ceremony was very powerful and spiritual...our very own Chancellor Shirley Horn was introduced and had a very eloquent keynote address. Chief Lyle Sayers did the welcome to their Traditional Territory and the drum welcome was by Miigwannanse (Little Feathers) Girls Drum Group, Eastview Public School.

Chief Jason Gauthier and his tenacious work was highlighted by Linda Savory-Gordon with the Algoma Passenger Trains (NORDIK) through the Indigenous and Non-Indigenous Communities partnering to save and sustain the Algoma Central Passenger Train.

In closing, we say "Ba maa pii" to Scott McCabe, Business Intern, who has left the organization to pursue other opportunities and we wish him all the success in his future endeavours. He brought enthusiasm to his position along with acquired knowledge from his educational program. We will miss his warm sense of humour and of course his thoughtfulness of June and Louise's Country Style Coffee!


From the Desk of:

LANDS AND RESOURCES ASSISTANT

Greetings, Everyone,

My name is Terri (Theresa) Nolan, member of Missanabie Cree First Nation and I just started a six month contract with MCFN as the Lands and Resources Assistant.

My first three days started out attending the first Land Management, Planning & Use Symposium. GDO AMIIMI-NAAN GANAWENDANDAAN (Taking Care of Our Land) was hosted by Algoma University, Anishinaabe Initiatives Division and the Department of Geography and Geology. They used the medicine wheel and these 4 themes as a guide in the planning and process of the symposium



We take so much for granted as we drive up and down the highways and don't realize the history that surrounds us. The first day of the workshop we went on a tour with Chief Dean Sayers of Batchewana First Nation to Goulais Bay and Obadjiwan (Batchewana) First Nation. I was surprised to learn that with the new construction of homes out there and with their own drilled wells that they still spent \$48,000 on bottled water for Obadjiwan First Nation.

Day Two and Three were spent listening to the presenters speaking on different aspects of "Taking care of our Land" The presenters ranged from a Judge, to Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK) Elders, Chiefs, Students, an Independent Scholar and Professors just to name a few.

Topics ranged from The Need for Reconciliation, Aboriginal Land Management in Context, GIS to Inform First Nation Decision Making, the Thessalon First Nation Wild Foods Distribution Hub, Use and Occupancy Mapping and the Garden River Highway and Land Agreement. There were many more interesting topics. I was overwhelmed with all the information I absorbed at this symposium. As I stated earlier, we take so much for granted through our journey of life.

I am super excited about learning more about the Lands and Resources in and around our traditional territory.

On May 19th, I was off to Thessalon First Nation to meet with Tamara Ashawasega and compared notes on food security with our intern Jessica Numminen from the University of Winnipeg and Janet Esquimaux.

May 20th and 21st we went to Missanabie to meet with Rick Macleod Farley to follow up on his "Site & Facility Review & Assessment" with Engineer Richard Lay in January of this year.

We were joined by Elder Shirley Horn who opened with a prayer and Band Manager, Cathy Clement. We reviewed the "Needs Assessment Report" as a result of their visit in January. What a productive two days! Lots of ideas were shared, to initiate the process of the development of the business case and needs assessment of Island View Camp.

It's been a whirlwind of three weeks of on-the-job training and I thoroughly enjoyed being a part of it! So until next month I hope this keeps you all in good spirits.

Hi, Missanabie Cree!

I want share some very important news with you.

I am an Elder on the Kunuwanimano Child & Family Services board and was elected in that position by a panel of approximately 20 Elders. The other person elected is John Archibald from the Taykwa Tagamou First Nation (formerly Newpost).

This organization represents 11 First Nations:

Missanabie Cree, Chapleau Cree, Chapleau Ojibwe,, Brunswick House, Mattagami, Beaver House. Mat-tachewan, Wahgoshig, Taykwa Tagomou, Constance Lake and Horne Payne

Kunuwanimano means "keeping our own".

Kunuwanimano just received official designation (May 1, 2015) as an Aboriginal Children's Aid Society, and is the 3rd Aboriginal CAS in Nishnawbe Aski Nation territory

and one of 10 in Ontario.

There was an official ceremony in Wahgoshig First Nation (which is where the head office is located but most of the administration and employees are in Timmins).

Many people attended including the executive and board, community members, youth, Elder and women drum groups, a cultural spokesperson – Elizabeth Babbin, government officials from the Ministry of Child & Family Services, Anishinaabe Abinoogi Child & Family Services, Treaty 3, which was the big sister, so to speak, in making the transition complete along with other CAS providers, Chiefs, Councillors, former board members to name a few and APTN. It was heartwarming to see this day happen as it has taken so long. Much like our land claim.

Cheryl Macumber was the representative Elder from Missanabie Cree, as well as myself even though I am there representing all the communities. It was good to see our Chief Gauthier and Councillor McCleod there too. So much food and a huge three layer, decorated cake that listed all the First Nations and Kuuwanimano. Vanessa

Grenier (Cheryl's daughter) is the official board member for MCFN and is a very active and involved part of the administration. She also had her three children in attendance.

It is a great day for us because each community will be asked to set up a Family Services Committee very soon to problem solve service issues and ensure communication systems are in good order with Kuu. The model is holistic in nature which encompasses traditional, western and bi-cultural practices and is guided by the Seven Grandfather Teachings. Children and families will have choices. This is definitely a process where we can exercise our sovereignty by looking after our own and having the say in how we do it. One speaker talked about how we are going to represent our children no matter where they live. Website below if you want to know more.
