Initialling the Land Transfer Agreement! We did it!



After years of protracted negotiations, and unexpected delays, the Land Transfer Agreement was initialled by both parties as approved in principle at a signing ceremony at the 2010 MCFN Annual Gathering in August.

Audrey Bateson, Chair of the Land Transfer Advisory Committee, and a former councillor for MCFN, signed the Agreement on behalf of the Missanabie Cree First Nation.

Dan Goodwin, Negotiator, Ministry of Aboriginal Affairs, signed on behalf of the Government of Ontario.

The ceremony was accompanied by an honour song by the women hand drummers of the Missanabie Cree First Nation.

Message from the Chief

Boozhoo, All my Relations,

My first couple weeks as Chief started with feelings of urgency, so much to do in so little time. I was anxious to get things rolling and the week off seemed to take forever. During the week off, I was in contact with the District Managers of the Wawa and Chapleau Ministry of Natural Resources. I let them know to expect our involvement in the many issues affecting our traditional territories: forest management planning, water management, development of the Manitou Mountain Protection Plan, Chapleau Area Aboriginal Resource Team, and the five-year review of our forestry agreement with the Ministry and Tembec. A call was also placed to Ron Martel Tembec Regional Manager notifying him of the review.

The first of three Mushkegowuk governance workshops was held here in the Sault August 30, 31 and September 1, 2010. Many of you may recall the surveys which were sent out by Vern Cheechoo early last winter. A date has been set to present the second workshop in Toronto on October 29,30 and 31. The third work shop will be held in Thunder Bay in November. Notice of this date will be announced in the October issue of the Bear Fax. Each set of workshops will build on the work of the previous participants. There is room for ten participants for each set of workshops. You should call the office at 1-800-319-3001 to ask June to have your name placed on the appropriate workshop list, Toronto or Thunder Bay. Please keep in mind this also includes members who are in the greater area of Toronto or Thunder Bay who want to participate. We can only provide the opportunity for our people to participate. It is up to you to make the most of these opportunities by putting your name forward.

In the coming weeks you will be receiving your Land Transfer Agreement ratification voting packages. I encourage you to read over the material. If there is anything you don't understand or have any questions, please don't hesitate to call the office. We will do our best to assist you to better understand the process or answer your questions. I am concerned with the number

of people who didn't participate in the election and hope that each of you will exercise your right to have a say in the process, vote and send your ratification ballots. As a member of the Land Transfer Advisory Committee, I endorse and support the agreement and transfer of lands to the Missanabie Cree, and ask you to make the most out of this opportunity, voting in favour of the agreement and transfer of lands.



The first Chief and Council meeting was held September 2, 2010. We have agreed to meet weekly when possible over the coming months so we may be able to become aware of the many issues we are faced with as well as becoming comfortable with each other. We have set a date for our Chief and Council orientation, a review of policies, priorities, and issues. It will also be an opportunity to become familiar with each other, understanding expectations, and what each of us would like to accomplish for our community in the coming three years. The orientation is set tentatively for October 23, 24, 2010, in Toronto. The date should be confirmed at this week's Chief and Council meeting on September 8, 2010.

In closing, I am excited about the prospects and challenges we will be faced with in the coming three years. I am not feeling so overwhelmed, knowing we have good people in our administration, on Council and within our community who will step forward to lighten the load. I am committed to ensure we present every possible opportunity for the participation and input of as many of our people who show an interest in becoming involved in building our community.

Manitou Mountain Protection Plan

To let everyone know my involvement in this process, I have been part of the process over the last six months, from being on the mountain to talking around the table on how to develop a plan for protection of this sacred mountain. The process has produced:

1. A working group for the Protection Plan of Manitou Mountain.
2. A process that is supported by Government and Missanabie Cree First Nation
3. Multi-Ministerial Participation
4. Limited Funding Support for the Protection Plan from MNR and MNDMF
5. Skilled Missanabie Cree Community Member involvement

Mushkegowuk Lands and Resources

I have represented MCFN as a participant in this process of land use planning for the last six months. The process has brought me to many meetings within the Mushkegowuk territory, and allowed me to be part of a working group dedicated to the process of resource management and identification of our values. This has been beneficial for Missanabie Cree:

1. Associated Funding potential for a Land Use Planning Coordinator position through the Ministry of Northern Development, Mines and Forestry.
2. Process that involves synergy between Missanabie Cree and the other Mushkegowuk First Nations
3. Training initiatives involving Land Use Planning
4. Values within our territory identification
5. Mapping, Global Positioning and Graphic Information Systems creation.

I will be participating in a workshop on Land Use Planning and be part of a "Panel" regarding Land Use Planning. The agenda is posted online at:

“Even after the province has sent out notices informing businesses that they must honour the rights of our citizens – on and off-reserve – to tax exemption, we are hearing stories of companies trying to gouge First Nations customers. These retailers are now breaking their own government’s laws, as well as ignoring First Nation

rights.”

The Grand Council Chief [Patrick Madahbee] called on citizens of the 40-member Anishinabek Nation communities to provide the nearest riding office of a member of the Ontario legislature with the name of any business refusing to respect their point-of-sale exemption to the eight percent provincial sales tax.

The ratification vote for the Land Transfer Agreement will take place by mail-in ballot.

The Voting Period for the Ratification of the Land Transfer Agreement ends at midnight on **November 15, 2010.**

The voting package will be mailed out to each elector of MCFN by September 17, 2010.

The package will include:

- Notice of Referendum and Voting Period
- A copy of the Land Transfer Agreement
- The Referendum Procedure
- A mail-in ballot, with a postage-paid return envelope, pre-addressed to the Electoral Officer
- A Voter Declaration Form

If you are an elector, and especially if you reach the age of 18 on or before November 15, 2010, please ensure that your mailing address is up-to-date with the Registration Administrator.

NAN LAUNCHES ANTI-BILL 191 CAMPAIGN

THUNDER BAY, ON: Nishnawbe Aski Nation (NAN) Grand Chief Stan Beardy, NAN Executive Council, NAN Chiefs and NAN Tribal Councils today officially launched their campaign opposing the Ontario Government's proposed Bill 191 (Far North Act).

"We are done talking, it's time to take serious action," said NAN Grand Chief Stan Beardy. "First Nations must have a say in how and when our land will be developed. Bill 191 takes away that right for our remote communities in the Far North. There's no other alternative for the McGuinty Government than to scrap this Bill and we will be ramping-up our efforts to ensure that message is loud and clear."

NAN Chiefs-in-Assembly unanimously declared their official opposition to Bill 191 on August 13, 2010 following a two-day emergency NAN Chiefs assembly in Thunder Bay, Ontario.

Beginning today, up until the scheduled Third Reading of Bill 191 in the Ontario Legislature in mid-September, NAN First Nations will be participating in a number of actions opposing Bill 191 – including, but not limited to: Letters/Editorials; Rally at Queen's Park; Distribution of materials such as pamphlets, posters etc.; Participation in radio programs broadcasts; Letters to Government, Industry and Environmental Groups; Meetings with Members of Provincial Parliament; Petitions opposing Bill 191.

"It is vital that we make NAN's presence and position known; we are coming together in unity to fight for what is rightfully ours," said Beardy.

CENSUS DEBATE IN PARLIAMENTARY COMMITTEE HEARINGS

The mandatory long-form census was once again at the centre of politically charged committee hearings Friday. The government has moved to scrap the mandatory long-form census and replace it with a voluntary one.

But opposition parties Friday had lined up mostly academics and officials from social-program organizations to warn of the dire consequences if Canadians were asked – not forced with threats of fines or even jail time – to fill out the 40-page questionnaire. The quality of the data that is at the heart of government and social policy would be greatly diminished, they warned, because it would not be representational of everyone. Maybe people with more time and more money on their hands would fill it out, while poor people with no time, or new Canadians who struggle with language barriers might not be willing to make the effort voluntarily.

"Let's accept that it will be less burdensome. I can choose not to fill out the form and there are no penalties. But that's the problem of reliability," said Mel Cappe, president of the Institute for Research on Public Policy. "You will not have a reliable output but it will be less burdensome."

For Friday's hearings, the government trotted out mostly witnesses speaking as individuals including a farmer, several new Canadians and a radio talk show host. Conservative MP Mike Lake said he thinks "patriotic Canadians" would fill out the voluntary long-form census even if it took time.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT SUBMITTING HST REFUND APPLICATIONS

As of September 1st, 2010 you can now submit your HST refund applications to the Ministry of Revenue for your refund on the Provincial sales tax portion (8%) of the (HST).

The refund application form is available on the Chiefs of Ontario website: www.chiefs-of-ontario.org. Please click the Harmonized Sales Tax box in the upper left hand corner for the refund application form and further details.

As well, as of September 1st, 2010 you should now be receiving point of sale exemption for the Provincial portion (8%) of the (HST) harmonized sales tax. You still pay the GST (5%).

AFN National Chief Welcomes New Minister of Indian Affairs

OTTAWA, Aug. 6 - Assembly of First Nations National Chief Shawn A-in-chut Atleo issued the following statement today on the occasion of the Prime Minister's cabinet shuffle, which sees former Parliamentary Secretary and Member of Parliament for Vancouver Island North John Duncan named the new Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development Canada, and Interlocutor for Métis and Non-Status Indians.

"The cabinet changes announced today come at a unique time for First Nations and Canada, a time when we see a critical mass of support for change and innovation in the relationship between First Nations and Canada.

First Nations confirmed our direction forward at the AFN's Annual General Assembly only two weeks ago, and earlier this week we met with provincial and territorial leaders to set a proactive and progressive agenda for the future. First Nations are ready to move, Canadians are ready to move, and we want to work with the federal government to move forward.

I congratulate the Honourable John Duncan on his new

assignment and welcome him as the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development Canada, and Interlocutor for Métis and Non-Status Indians. I am well acquainted with Mr. Duncan. We have worked together in the past and I look forward to working with him in his new role. I extend an invitation for us to meet as soon as possible to begin setting out an agenda aimed at building stronger First Nations and a stronger Canada.

I want to acknowledge the former Minister of Indian Affairs, the Honourable Chuck Strahl and thank him for his hard work and dedication and wish him well as he assumes his new role and responsibilities. We look forward to a continuing, constructive relationship.

First Nations are ready to work together in a spirit of partnership and respect to create a better Canada for all citizens of this land."

Any other suggestions for the cook book would greatly be appreciated.






To Neil Ewing and Brent Fletcher, grandsons of John E. and Hazel Fletcher, upon their graduation June 2010.

COUNCIL OF CANADIANS CELEBRATES UN GENERAL ASSEMBLY RECOGNITION OF HUMAN RIGHT TO WATER

July 28, 2010 - After over a decade of hard work, the global water justice movement achieved a major victory today as the United Nations General Assembly voted overwhelmingly in favour of recognizing water and sanitation as human rights. The resolution – put forward by Bolivia and co-sponsored by 35 states – passed overwhelmingly with 122 states voting in favour and 41 abstaining.

“It was a great honour to be present as the UN General Assembly took this historic step forward in the struggle for a just world,” says Maude Barlow, national chairperson of the Council of Canadians. “It is sad however, that Canada chose not to participate in this important moment in history.”

The organization is calling on states to build on this victory. “This resolution has the overwhelming support of a strong majority of countries, despite a handful of power-

GULF COAST OIL SPILL WILL IMPACT FIRST NATIONS

The man-made environmental disaster taking place in the Gulf of Mexico is absolutely horrific. The oil spill is extremely concerning because of the catastrophic damage it is causing to the wintering grounds and the several waterfowl that use the Mississippi floodway. This will have a negative impact on the people of Nishnawbe Aski Nation.

The geese and ducks that use the Mississippi floodway are an essential part of the diet of the Nishnawbe Aski people. Not only are these animals used as a source of protein at a minimal cost – compared to the high cost of bringing in equivalents to our communities from south-

ful opponents. It must now be followed-up with a renewed push for water justice,” says Anil Naidoo, Blue Planet Project organizer. “We are calling for actions on the ground in communities around the world to ensure that the rights to water and sanitation are implemented. Governments, aid agencies and the UN must take their responsibilities seriously.”

As a result of this vote, the human right to water and sanitation is now explicitly and formally recognized at the UN.

“Canada's abstention from the vote will not excuse it from the work that needs to be done to maintain and improve its public water and sanitation systems for all peoples living in Canada, including Indigenous communities who have lived for generations without adequate infrastructure,” says Meera Karunanathan, national water campaigner at the Council of Canadians.

The impact and cost of the oil spill will go far beyond the Gulf States. It will negatively impact the health and economy of our people. It's essential to make our concerns known to those governing bodies and companies who can help stop a disaster in our very own neighbourhood.
