- Attended the Nishnawbe Aski Nation Youth and Elder gathering in Thunder Bay. Youth and elders gathered to discuss the various health issues which impact individuals and communities. 95 % of the elders spoke in Cree or Oji-Cree, they talked specific issues i.e. having to travel out of their communities to access health care services such as dialysis, often having to travel alone. Requested youth seek more health care careers to better support their communities as there is a high turn over of non-native health workers in the northern communities, i.e. mental health, nurses, doctors, who have little or no experi-

ence working with Indigenous people. Ovide Mercredi stated communication and engagement is crucial to bring about the necessary change and transformation within First Nation communities.

#### MCFN Environmental Steward - Mushkegowuk Council

Hello.

It's that time of year when everyone is out fishing and loading up on sunscreen and planting their gardens and carrying on with their summer activities while enjoying the sunshine. I thought I would provide some information to keep in mind while out buying all the necessary products you may need during the summer.

#### **SUNSCREEN**

I have provided some information that I found while researching safe sunscreens to use since Global Warming is affecting our climate and as a result we can't go outside without protecting ourselves from the UV rays. One thing to keep in mind is making sure your sunscreen does not have the chemical Oxybenzone which gets into the bloodstream and not only causes allergic reactions but can affect your hormones. So, anything that is labeled 50+SPF will most likely contain Oxybenzone and can cause health risks such as tissue damage and disrupt your hormones. What is recommended is using sunscreens that only stay on the surface of the skin and are not absorbed into the blood stream...So finding sunscreens that include ingredients such as zinc oxide and or titanium dioxide. Both reflect light and are safer alternatives. Or you can buy clothing that has UV protection and wear a hat and not stay in the sun for prolonged periods of time especially for children.

#### FISHING INFORMATION

I provide a link on some information on the effects of lead in our waters and how it can affect the wildlife and humans. The brochures will be brought to the gathering this year and the link will also be on the MCFN website. This information was provided by the Halifax Wildlife Association and was sent to us from Laurentian University. There is also some other information on the brochure about hunters using copper tipped bullets instead of lead based and what the difference is.

A list is provided in the brochure of how lead tackle affects birds and fish on how it can result in the lead being ingested by both birds and fish, which can be fatal. Al-

so, birds that have been shot with lead bullets can also be ingested by humans since lead bullets explode rather than staying intact and the small fragments are then ingested. Gut piles left behind and carcasses that have the lead fragments are also ingested by animals and birds. Other non-lead alternatives can be used such as steel, tin, bismuth and tungsten which are safer for our wildlife and for ourselves and future generations. ### Post-secondary funding applications for 2018 – 2019 academic year was May 15<sup>th</sup> 2018.

Funding is not guaranteed. Transcripts/official academic summaries are required at the end of each semester. Reimbursements for transcripts are available.

Students need to be aware of the terms of their agreements and the policies that are used. The Indigenous Services Canada National Guidelines for 2018-2019 are on the Indigenous Services Canada website: search for "psssp 20182019."

All students are requested to apply for student loans, grants, bursaries, awards and scholarships: each post-secondary institution has financial supports available for indigenous students. It is the student's responsibility to apply for these extra supports. The financial support provided through our post-secondary student support program funded by the federal government is not guaranteed to cover all of a student's costs.

#### **Graduates from 2012 to Current Year**

All past and recent graduates, please know that if you have not sent in a copy of your Diploma, Degree or Certificate yet that means your file is not compliant to policy. We also need these to plan our graduate recognition event at the Annual Gathering. If you would like to see your name in print as a graduate, please contact the Education Officer.

As per the recent emphasis on compliance to policy, files going back to 2012 are being reviewed. If you are not sure, please contact your Education Officer.

### Did you know.....

According to the Native Women's Association of Canada 51% of trafficked persons are Indigenous

Human trafficking happens within our communities and not only in large urban cities

Human trafficking can occur with the victim not having to be moved anywhere

94% of trafficking cases are domestic (happening within Canada with no movement)

The average age of victims being recruited into sex trafficking is 12-14 years old

50% of the victims of trafficking are under the age of 14 years old.

Indigenous women , girls, and LGBTQ are extremely vulnerable to being trafficking

Risk factors for being trafficked include being homeless, runaway, being in child welfare, addiction, poverty, past abuse, early entry into street life, low self-esteem, problems with family and not feeling loved.

## HUMAN TRAFFICKING IS ON THE RISE AND THE TRAFFICKING VIOLATIONS HAS DOUBLED SINCE 2014!

This is not intended to release Missanabie Cree First Nation from any liability resulting from their intentional conduct.

I further covenant and agree not to institute any claims or legal action against Missanabie Cree First Nation for any claim released by this Agreement. I further agree that should any claim be made against Missanabie Cree First Nation in contravention of this Agreement, including but not limited to derivative claims, I will protect, defend and completely indemnity (reimburse) Missanabie Cree First Nation for any such claim and expenses including attorney's fees and costs incurred by in defending themselves or security indemnity hereunder.

- I understand that Missanabie Cree First Nation is not responsible for any lost, stolen, or damaged valuables or property.
- I acknowledge that I have received and read this Waiver and Release of Liability Agreement. I agree that I will fully comply with all rules and regulations and with any amendments.

I have read the Agreement and understand that by signing the Agreement I have consented to be bound by its terms, including the waiver/release of any legal right I may have to sue Missanabie Cree First Nation for any costs they incur because a claim or legal action is brought in violation of this Agreement. We have a vision of a people who are bi-cultural and bi-lingual; a people who can walk in both worlds contributing to our well-being, the well-being of our brother and sister First Nations; contributing and competing globally.

We have a vision of a Nation of people who respect the dignity of all; a people who find balance through equality of all ages, male and female alike.

We have a vision of people who respect the environment, harvesting and reaping the resources of the land in a sustainable manner as responsible stewards for the use of future generations.

We are the Anishnabe of the Missanabie Cree First Nation whose vision it is to regain and restore our rightful place and through the strength of our people, never again be denied our place in society.
